Mr. Ronald D. Primavera, 81, died on January 25, 2017 at the Chester County Hospital in West Chester, PA.

Born in South Philadelphia Ronnie was a graduate of South Philadelphia High School. He was a longtime resident of Morton and a member of Our Lady of Perpetual Help church. He later moved to West Chester to be closer to his family.

Mr. Primavera was employed with Boeing Aircraft as a tool and die maker until his retirement in 1999. Earlier in his life he was a professional drummer studying under Buddy Rich. He played with the Viber Notes locally and toured with the Glen Miller Band.

Ronnie's artistic side was evident as he shared many of his oil paintings with family and friends. He also enjoyed playing and teaching pinochle. Most of all he loved spending time with his grandsons Mike and Nick.

He is survived by two daughters Anna Marie Primaver of Laguna Niguel, CA, and Michele (John) Halcovich of West Chester, PA and their two sons Mike and Nick. He was predeceased by his wife Jean Primavera marriage of 42

years, in January of 2000.
